

## Announcement the amendment the fund scheme of the funds

3 April 2026

Aberdeen Asset Management (Thailand) Limited would like to inform you that we have received an approval from the Office of the Securities and Exchange Commission (the "SEC Office") to amend the fund scheme of the funds. Details of the amendments can be summarized as follows.

1. abrdn Global Sustainable Equity Fund (ABWOOF)
2. abrdn All China Sustainable Equity Fund (ABCG-M)
3. abrdn European Sustainable Equity Fund (ABEG)
4. abrdn Japanese Sustainable Equity Fund (ABJO)
5. abrdn China A Share Sustainable Equity Fund (ABCA)
6. abrdn Global Small Cap Fund (ABGS-M)
7. abrdn India Growth Fund (ABIG)

### Summary of the Amendments of the Fund's Scheme

1. Amending the investment approach used by the above mentioned 7 master funds to select companies from ESG House Score to the Overall Sustainability Assessment (OSA) of the Aberdeen group. The OSA will provide a clearer and more comprehensive sustainability profile of the fund based on the attributes and categorisation of the companies in which the master fund invests. The OSA will provide an overall view of a company's sustainability based on scoring of its governance, operations, and products and/or services. This broader assessment of sustainability will allow the master fund manager to assess and review the fund's holdings in a more holistic and transparent manner.

2. Update of the Sustainable Investments approach proportions in accordance with under Sustainable Finance Disclosure Regulation (SFDR) of the master fund as follows, to reflect the current information as stated in the master fund's prospectus. This is in accordance with the reservation rights specified in the fund scheme.
